Statutory Consultation

Proposed Zebra Crossing on Palace Gates Road, N22

Dear Resident or Business,

Following requests from the local community, and as part of this year's Road Danger Reduction Investment Plan, the Council is proposing to introduce a zebra crossing on Palace Gates Road between Crescent Road and Bedford Road.

Officers have investigated the latest 5 years collision data at this location and can confirm there have been 3 slight and 1 serious recorded personal injury accidents (PIAs). The serious PIA involved a pedestrian.

The proposed zebra crossing will provide a clearly defined crossing point and will give pedestrians the right of way over traffic, enabling them to cross the road safely, which will assist in reducing road traffic accidents.

Details of the proposal are listed below and set out on the plan overleaf:

- Reconstruct the existing block paved raised table, adjacent to nos. 7/7A Palace Gates Road to tarmac.
- Introduce a zebra crossing on the reconstructed raised table, including associated lighting equipment and road markings.
- Reduce the permit parking only bay by 4.5m outside by nos. 9/9A Palace Gates Road, to provide adequate visibility.
- Reduce the pay by phone parking bay by 7.5m outside no. 16 Palace Gates Road, to provide adequate visibility.
- Relocate the existing Bikehanger from outside no.16 Palace Gates Road to outside no. 18 Palace Gates Road.
- Provide high skid resistant surface treatment on the approach to the zebra crossing.

In order to introduce the proposals and legally enforce their use, we are required to enter into a period of consultation known as Statutory Consultation. This is the legal part of the process and takes the form of a Public Notice advertised in the local press, London Gazette and visible locations within the area to inform the public of the Council's intentions.

The statutory consultation process normally runs for three weeks but given the approaching summer holiday period, it will run for five weeks until **14th August 2024.** You can send us your objection or representation by scanning the QR code above or using the link to complete our online feedback form. Alternatively, you can use the enclosed Freepost feedback card. If you object to the scheme, please give reasons for your objection.

What Happens Next

Any objections or submissions will be considered by the Council before a decision is made. If the decision is made to implement the changes proposed, we will then send you a further letter informing you when works will commence on site.
